THE DOLLAR MENU

Ah, McDonald's. Home of the Big Mac and obesity. But as much as we all may insult it and pretend to hate it, everyone goes there sooner or later. So whenever your road takes you beneath those Golden Arches, I've got a few tips to make the experience as enjoyable as possible.

Before I get started, I have just one formal disclaimer.

All of my information is based off the McDonald's owned and operated by the Courtesy Corporation, which controls most of the McDonald's in Wisconsin, Iowa, and Illinois. Menu offerings, prices, and procedures will vary outside of this region, as different owners have different rules. Now without further ado, I will begin the first topic: the Dollar Menu.

The Dollar Menu, though small, is a well-loved menu consisting of no more than 10 lunch items, but it can be utilized in many creative ways. The McDouble, being roughly 30 cents cheaper than the Double Cheeseburger, is probably the most ordered item on the menu. By default, it comes with mustard, ketchup, soggy onion shrapnel, two floppy pickles, and a slice of that yellow plastic called “American Cheese”. However, this can be vastly improved. Finally, to celebrate the football season, they are now frying up Mighty Wings (though they are far from cheap.) All of these items are limited time only, so get them while you still can!
