Now I will give you a clue. It's yellow, not green or black or even blue. It tastes great in pie, a salad, and a shake, too. If you guessed banana, that would be true.

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
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

Lancer Varsity Volleyball

The Lancers are looking to continue to be successful this year. After last year's promising season ended in the Regional Championship against Turtle Lake, Immanuel is trying to get back to that championship, and possibly even further.

Immanuel, under Coach Prof. Joe Lau, have gone an impressive 8-1 (all losses to C-FC) in the Dairyland Conference each of the past three years. They will join the half of the 2013 team who did not graduate last year. 
