

INFORMED OPINION

n the aftermath of the December 1 Lady Lancers' victory over Lake Holcomb by a score of 91-18, several people were overheard to say things such as, "That was classless," or "Why did you run up the score?" or "Well that was poor sportsmanship," and other similar comments, some from people who didn't even see the game. Obviously everyone is entitled to an opinion, but I would like you to consider some of the following thoughts before you jump on that bandwagon.

1) Every player on the roster played 10-12 minutes of the 32-minute game. Three different groups of players substituted in at regular intervals throughout the entire game. We did not play our normal starting lineup together once during the entire game. Had we used our normal substitution pattern, the score would have been worse and that would have been unsportsmanlike, even in my opinion. We pressed full-court for less than 2 ½ minutes of the entire 32 minute game. The rest of the game we fell back into a half-court defense. Had we pressed the entire game you would be able to say that we "ran up the score."

Every player got multiple shots at the basket and almost everyone scored for the Lady Lancers. Three players scored in double figures. If we had played the starters the whole way, that would have seemed poor sportsmanship.

This was the third game of the year, a time when new players to the team are still learning both offense and defense. We worked on four different offenses and four different defenses as part of the learning process. If this were the 17th game of the season, you might be able to say that we ran up the score unmercifully, but this early in the season so much needs to be learned that can't be simulated in practice against teammates.

As a former player and a former coach who has been on the other end of lopsided games, I would be much more embarrassed if a team eased up and did not take open shots when they were available or dribbled out on a breakaway layup to "set it up." It's my opinion, but that would be much more humiliating to me than a lopsided score.

As a coach, we try to teach players when they have an open shot, when a pass is available, when a drive is open, etc. Once learned, it is very difficult as a player not to make that open pass or take that open shot; it's just part of the game. The girls ran offense and hit open players who took open shots. Many of the points we scored were second chance rebound put-backs that simply come from hustling players.

Having said all the above, I will admit that there were some things we probably could have done to keep the score down and will likely do next time this situation comes up. If you think about it, very seldom, if ever, has an Immanuel team been in this situation, so it kind of caught us off guard and the score got away on us. We got caught up in the success of the moment. Please remember that your Lady Lancer players should not be faulted for playing hard and doing what they had been coached to do. If you have issue, as a student, a fan, or a faculty member, please come to the coaches with your opinion rather than criticize the players, your classmates.

I hope that the thoughts above help you understand what happened in our game with Lake Holcombe. I'm quite sure that should we find ourselves in that same situation, we will be more ready to handle it.


Breaking Down
